## **Peoria QC Law Enforcement Executive Teams Trip**

In November, representatives from the Davenport, Bettendorf, Rock Island, and Moline Police Departments as well as the US Attorney's Office for the Southern District of Iowa, visited the Peoria Police Department to learn about their new gun violence task force that was implemented in conjunction with their federal partners at the US Attorney's Office for the Central District of Illinois and the ATF. The Davenport Police Department and neighboring law enforcement partners are discussing a similar task force model that would concentrate on long-term gun investigations with the aim of lowering violent crime in the Quad Cities. The discussion of this potential task force coincides with the recent advocacy trip taken by local city and law enforcement leadership to advocate for additional federal resources to the Quad City area to assist with violent crime reduction.

The Davenport Fire Department hosted a promotional ceremony for nine recently promoted individuals. These promotions represent four different ranks within the organization and a combined 148 years of service. #### **DPD Hosts Master FTO Course**

The Davenport Police Department's Training Bureau hosted a 40-hour Applied Police Training and Certification (APTAC) Field Training Officer (FTO) Master Trainer Course. This provided an opportunity for law enforcement training officers throughout the Midwest to become certified to oversee an FTO program and instruct on various training methods and procedures. Four Davenport Police supervisors were certified as FTO Master Trainers.



# **Skybridge Re-Opening & New Signage**

Davenport's iconic Skybridge is set to re-open on December 12, following rehabilitation of the north tower and removal of the lower pedestrian walkway. The restoration project was needed to keep this amenity and its spectacular views of the Mississippi River around for years to come. With the re-opening, the bridge will also be fitted with new signage promoting a positive visitor experience and courteous use by all.



# **Snow Preparation**

Winter weather preparations were knocked out in time for the first accumulating snow of the year on November 15. The fleet of 42 large and

14 small trucks are fitted with plows and spreaders, and an additional 11 small plows, that generally serve snow removal at City facilities, are ready to go and will be available when needed for significant events. In addition, the City's eight high-capacity brine units and six graders have been prepped for snow duty.



Topping off the winter prep to-do list included setting snow team staffing, refresher training, and running through routes to become familiar. Salt preparations were completed in October, with the last shipment placing 18,415 tons of salt on hand to begin the season.

Public education and awareness on snow-related topics, such as what to expect when it snows and signing up for snow emergency alerts, has started and will continue through the spring.

# **Supervisor Training**

Human Resources recently provided supervisor training, designed specifically for the City's managers and department heads. In addition to updates on Administrative Policies, benefits, and the Employee Assistance Program (EAP), HR staff incorporated results from the feedback survey that attendees responded to last year. Training focused on the two most requested topics which were the Family and Medical Leave Act (FMLA) and conflict resolution.

Supervisors were educated on the basics of FMLA, including an overview of the federal law, appropriate uses, and the responsibilities of employees and supervisors when an eligible employee requests leave. Conflict Resolution and the Expectations for a Modern Workforce was presented by Dr. LaDrina Wilson. In this interactive session, strategies to strengthen communication and reduce internal and external conflict were offered for staff to incorporate into daily routines.



# The Davenport Pulse Podcast Highlights Several Small Businesses

Leading up to the holidays and Small Business Saturday, hosts of *The Davenport Pulse Podcast* had the opportunity to speak with several local small business owners including Honey Creek Gems Rock Shop, Wind Dancer Boutique, The Brewed Book Coffee Shop and Used Book Store, Hats, Hair 'n Wigs, and Blue Spruce General Store. Owners highlighted their business, sharing with listeners what products they offer and what kind of experience people can expect when stopping by.

# **Solid Waste Calendar Changes**

Davenport is making changes to its annual recycling and bulky waste calendar program. The shift comes after evaluating the cost, benefit, and use of the annually mailed calendar. In 2023, residents will no longer be mailed the yearly magnet calendar. Instead, residents can pick one up at the following locations: Eastern, Fairmount, and Main Libraries; the Davenport Public Works Center; Davenport City Hall; The River's Edge; and any Davenport Hy-Vee location.

This 2022 collection season will also be the last year residents can place up to three extra bags of garbage outside of their cart without stickers following the Thanksgiving holiday. In 2023, stickers will be required on extra bags placed for collection after the holiday. While the extra garbage allowance following Thanksgiving is removed in 2023, the City will also be increasing the number of bags placed without a sticker following the Christmas holiday from three to five.

#### **DREAM Round 4**

DREAM Round 4 was extremely successful, awarding a total of \$720,000 to twenty-eight current homeowners and eight new homeowners. Two \$20,000 awards for new homeowners are still available. A total of 168 applications were received for the existing homeowner program. Next steps include meeting with the awarded homeowners before the end of 2022 or in early 2023 to finalize work plans. An open house for homeowners to meet area contractors interested in bidding on projects is tentatively scheduled for January 2023.

#### **DREAM Plus**

The City received over 750 inquiries, resulting in 112 applications submitted by property owners in the focused geographic area of the Gaines Street Corridor. Of those applications, 73 were from homeowners and 39 from rental property owners.

Based upon a scoring matrix considering the type of rehab, impact, and feasibility of each project, a total of 30 homeowners and 20 rental properties were awards funding. Individual award amounts were up to \$50,000 for homeowners and up to \$20,000 for rental properties.

Staff is currently developing work plans for each project so property owners can obtain competitive bids/quotes with contracts being signed in the winter and the first projects tentatively starting in 2023.

# **Re-Opening Of Two Major Roadways**

East 53rd Street and Division Street were re-opened prior to the Thanksgiving holiday. The projects are just two of many demonstrating the City's commitment to improving infrastructure.

The \$16.2 million East 53rd Street project is a four-year, two-phase, multi-segment higher volume road project that reconstructed the street between Brady and Eastern in Phase I in 2020-2021 and completed three of five segments in Phase II in 2022. Segments completed in 2022 included the intersections of Eastern Avenue and 53rd, Jersey Ridge Road and 53rd, and the stretch of 53rd located between Lorton Avenue and Elmore Circle.

Segments four and five of Phase II will reconstruct Eastern Avenue to Jersey Ridge Road and Jersey Ridge Road to Lorton Ave in 2023. Once complete in 2023, East 53rd Street will have been fully reconstructed, widened in spots, with a recreational trail added and utility and stormwater improvements from Brady Street to Elmore Circle.


The \$3.4 million Division Street project was a two-year, two-phase project that reconstructed the street between 5th and 9th Streets in 2020 and 12th and Locust Streets in 2022.
